HISTORY

Some history on our cemetery. We are recognizing one of our city's founders as well as the donor of the cemetery property. Samuel Warren was born on May 16th, 1838, to Nathaniel and Julia Ann Whitecomb in Upper Sandusky, Ohio.

Samuel mustered into the Army on Sept. 1st, 1862, and served as a Private in the 100th Ohio Infantry Co. H. He was taken prisoner of war on Feb. 22nd, 1863, in Richmond, Kentucky where he took care of fellow soldiers. He served in the Army until the end of the Civil War on 4/9/1865 and mustered out on 5/29/1865.

After the war he returned home to Ohio where he began practicing medicine. He had already married Rebecca Shadle and together they had seven children. They made their way to Roy, WA in 1884 and lived in the hollow of a tree while building their home which was located on Warren and Water St. Samuel loved to fish in Muck Creek so much that he built a hotel for fishermen to come stay at while on their fishing excursions.

Warren also practiced medicine throughout the area and was the Postmaster of Roy.

When his wife Rebecca died on March 30th, 1889, Samuel donated the land for the Roy Cemetery and Rebecca was the first burial there. Rebecca's headstone is hard to miss when driving into the west entrance of the cemetery. Her white pillar is shining bright on the right-hand side just after entering the cemetery and is placed by Samuel's marker. Roy would not be what it is and neither would the cemetery if it wasn't for the generosity of Dr. Samuel Warren. Samuel later married Anna Glemmon on October 7th, 1889, and had 2 more children. Samuel passed away in Roy on April 8th, 1915.
