HISTORY

James McNaught 1842-1919

James McNaught was born in 1842 in Lexington, Illinois. He served in the Civil War, on the Union side, leaving as a Colonel. He graduated from a Law school in Chicago, IL in 1864. In 1871, he married Agnes Martha Hyde in Seattle, WA. They had two children, Mary Alice (born 1875) and Roy Hyde (born 1876). His career as an Attorney included several law firms in Olympia, Seattle, Anacortes, Portland, New York, as well as serving as United States Attorney General. He invested in real estate in Seattle in 1875, building his home, and with real estate developer Martin Van Buren Stacy and Henry Yesler, lived in homes considered to be "the three most lavish mansions in the city". McNaught spent many years with the railroad. In I869, McNaught became a director of and attorney for the Seattle and Walla Walla Railroad. From I880-I896, he was retained as General Counsel for the Northern Pacific Railroad, he was the President of the NP Manitoba Railroad, and built and financed the Great Northern Railroad in Canada and Guatemala. In 1883 he invested in the Anacortes townsite as a front man for the railroad. That same year, the NPRR finally completed its true transcontinental line to Tacoma. In 1889, he moved to New York, where he represented the railroad until I896 and then established a private practice there until I903. During his railroad career, he became friends and fishing buddies with Dr. Samuel Warren, who was the NPRR Physician in charge of incidents between Tenino and Tacoma. During those years, they found the area of Media to have great fishing. He liked the area so much that in the early 1880's, he purchased 600 acres here and platted out the township of Roy. Media was the original name for Roy as it was halfway between Tenino and Tacoma. McNaught and Warren then changed the name to Roy after McNaught's son Roy. Dr Warren did not want the town to be named after himself, so they decided on Roy. Dr Warren made his home here with his family, but McNaught never did. In 1883, he deeded property to the Northern Pacific Railroad to be used for railroad purposes, as well as in I884, deeding the remaining land to the town of Roy, establishing McNaught's Ist and 2nd Additions. Agnes died I918 in Seattle. In I919, James dropped dead in the railroad station while waiting for a train after visiting his daughter, Mary Alice Ling in Tarrytown, New York. Roy Hyde McNaught (1876-1951) was a Harvard Graduate (1900) and became President of a real estate brokerage and management firm in New York, where he later died. He too never lived in the town that was his namesake.
